LITTLE VOCAL WARM-UPS

Here are some ideas to prepare the children for a singing activity.

When we sing, our whole body sings!

It is important that our body and our voice are wide awake and well warmed-up before we start singing.

It only takes a few minutes by following these 3 phases of vocal warm-up!

WAKE UP THE BODY

Stretches

- We stretch by trying to touch the sky with our fingertips.
- We yawn silently and while making noise.
- Shrug and contract the shoulders, then release them while breathing.

Anchor to the ground

- Root yourself in the floor like a tree and make soft movements in all directions with your arms (as if the wind was blowing in our branches).
- The wind blows hard and pushes us forward, then backward, but our roots are solid and we stay firmly anchored in the earth.

Face massage

- We imagine we have a huge piece of gum in our mouth that forces us to make all kinds of faces.
- We massage the face, the temples, the forehead, the cheeks, the sides of the nose, the chin, the neck, and the shoulders.

LITTLE VOCAL WARM-UPS (CONTINUED)

WAKE UP THE BREATH

Inhalation

- When I inhale, I breathe air into my nose, my mouth, and my lungs.
- Inhale through the nose, like when you want to smell a flower that smells good.
- Exhale with a sound of exclaimed "AH!" of admiration.

Exhalation (blow)

- To exhale is to let air out. We can let air out gently or heavily.
- Exhale gently by blowing soft like when you make a candle flame flutter without blowing it out
- Exhale heavily by blowing hard like when you blow out the candles on a birthday cake!

Exhalation (on sound)

- Exhale by imitating a light breeze.
- Exhale by imitating a strong and powerful wind.

WAKE UP THE VOICE

Range: The extent of the voice from the deepest sound to the highest sound we can since

- Make siren sounds with your voice while drawing a big circle with your hand.
- Sing your first name while changing the pitch of your voice.
- Play with changing your voice by incarnating different characters.

ACTIVITY CONTENT

Gabi wants to find out where the magic of winter comes from!

- Have you noticed that the days get shorter and the sun sets earlier when winter arrives?

The trees lose their leaves and slowly the cold sets in.

Humans have been living with the seasons for a very long time.

- What is your favourite season? Why is that?

All over the world, there are all kinds of celebrations around winter and many legends tell us about winter ...

WHAT IS A LEGEND?

In great-grandmother Gertrude's library, there are many dusty books in which we find all kinds of legends about winter.

- But, in fact, what is a legend?

A legend is a story in which the real and imaginary are mixed.

Maybe by exploring the legends, we will discover the secret behind the magic of winter?

- Do you know any winter legends?

We can think of Santa Claus, elves, Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer, the yeti, the Old Man Winter ...

ONCE UPON A TIME

We discover a legend that comes from the scandinavian region (Sweden, Norway).

This is the legend of Julenisse, a generous and prankster elf!

Once upon a time, in the great Swedish forest, there was a tiny, elderly little elf named Julenisse. Legend has it that he wore a long beard and possessed magical powers such as being invisible and talking to animals.

He lived on farms and protected the inhabitants!

A long time ago before Christmas even existed, during the longest and coldest night of the year that we called "the winter solstice"; while the farmers slept, our dearest Julenisse the house elf watched over the farm and brought gifts, joy, and luck to the whole household ...

No one has ever seen Julenisse the elf, but everyone secretly dreams of having a lucky charm elf that brings happiness to their long winters!

Keep an eye out, because Julenisse can surprise us at any time!

- Do you too have a holiday elf or a good luck charm? Let's see how the children's imaginations play out...

WHAT DOES IT MEAN: SOLSTICE?

The solstice is the ancestor of the 4 seasons you know! Before the existence of the calendar, humans used the light of the sun or the movement of the moon to know in which season of the year they were!

In the word **solstice**, we hear the word "sol," which is Latin for sun. Why? We know that the earth revolves around the sun. It makes one complete turn in a year!

Solstice represents a time of the year when the sun shines on the earth in a certain way:

- The winter solstice represents the day when the sun sets very early and the night is therefore the longest of the year. It takes place around December 20th. From that moment on, the days will start to get longer.
- The summer solstice represents the day when the sun sets very late and the night is therefore the shortest of the year. It takes place around June 20th. From that moment on, the days start to get shorter.

JULENISSE'S GIFT: HANS THE PIED PIPER OF HAMELIN

In opening the green gift, Gabi finds a tiny sopranino recorder and a stange message!

Julenisse's magic formula:

"O Tannenbaum, O Tannenbaum Wie treu sind deine Blätter"

- Are you able to repeat this magic formula?
- Do you know this language?

In a cloud of smoke appears Hans, the Pied Piper of Hamelin.

Hans teaches us that legends are often born from real events that have affected people. From these events, and over the years, all sorts of stories and legends have been invented.

The legend of Hans was inspired by an event that occurred in 1284 in Germany in the small town of Hamelin. This town was infested with rats, much to the dismay of its inhabitants. The legend testifies to the fear of the inhabitants of the town for centuries!

The Pied Piper of Hamelin was published in "German Legends" in 1816 by the Brothers Grimm.

THE HOLIDAY SEASON IN GERMANY: THE TRADITION OF THE CHRISTMAS TREE

The tradition of the Christmas tree comes from the Middle Ages. During the winter solstice celebrations in Germany, a tree (often a spruce since it remained green and did not lose its needles), a symbol of life, was decorated with fruits, flowers, and wheat around December 20th. By decorating the tree with natural offerings, they were celebrating the sun and the spring that was coming back.

DELVE DEEPER BY WATCHING

The Wonderful Adventures of Nils is a Swedish novel by Selma Lagerlöf.

Originally created to introduce **Swedish folklore** to young children in Sweden, the story of this little boy has spread all over the world:

The story tells of the adventures of a small Swedish farm boy who is reduced to a tiny size by a goblin's curse and is taken to travel with a flock of wild geese. Nils travels through a large part of Sweden, each stop presenting a new region and bringing about adventures linked to local tales and legends.







ACTIVITY CONTENT

Gabi continues her search to discover where the magic of winter comes from.

- Do you remember the gift that Hans the Pied Piper gave us in the first workshop?

Hans gave us a beautiful Christmas tree and a fabulous song in German.

- Can you sing the tune of *Oh Christmas Tree* that you learned?

Gabi is going to look for a new legend in her great-grandmother Gertrude's library.

ONCE UPON A TIME ...

In the red book, we discover an incredibly old legend!

Once upon a time, a long time ago in Italy, there was a very, very, very old woman ... Very, very, very, very old, that means she was at least 1000 years old!

This old woman was always walking around with bags full of sweets and treats for the good kids! For the kids who were naughty, she gave them coal! It's hard to say precisely whether this old woman we call La Befana was nice or mean. But the Italian children loved to give her green soup so that she would be nice to them and shower them with candies! La Befana reminds us a little bit of Santa Claus who brings presents to good children. But La Befana offers her gifts on January 6th and not on December 25th like Santa.

- Do you know any witches?
- Are they nice or mean?
- Do you think all witches are bad?

Let the children express their imaginings.

JULENISSE'S GIFT: LA BEFANA

When Gabi opens the red gift, she finds a broom!

- Have you ever received strange gifts?

Julenisse's magic formula:

"Viene viene la Befana, Viva viva la Befana"

- Are you able to repeat this magic formula?
- Do you know this language?

In a cloud of smoke appears a very old lady who is looking for her broom!

THE LEGEND OF LA BEFANA

The origin of la Befana goes back to well before the arrival of Christianity, so it would be at least 5500 years old! Before being associated with the Magi and the Epiphany, la Befana was embodied in the guise of a goddess who represented the spirit of the ancients who protected Italian homes in winter. If la Befana protected the house, then the harvest would be good!

La Befana presents herself to the Italian peasants under the guise of an old lady with a hooked nose symbolizing a Mother Nature tired of having put all her energy into making the earth fertile! She is the promise that spring will return!

Nowadays, Italian children and parents look forward to January 6th to exchange sweets or gifts!

THE HOLIDAY SEASON IN ITALY: THE STOCKING TRADITION

A stocking full of sweets for the good kids and loaded with coal for the others! La Befana is quite old and she prefers to offer the first option to everyone. Phew! In Rome, this same Befana walks the piazza Navona, between the stalls of the Christmas market where thousands of stockings of la Befana are hung. Without a doubt in Rome, all children are good! Elsewhere in Italy, in Venice, Florence, Naples, Milan, Lecce, etc., la Befana stockings colour the streets and the houses and make the children happy.

The Broom Dance of the Sorcerer's Apprentice by Dukas

A sorcerer's apprentice tries to animate a broom to do his job: fill a basin with water with buckets. But the broom doesn't want to do anything else...

Listen to the audio and identify the different actions and emotions in Dukas' music.

- The moment when the apprentice tries to enchant the broom.
- The moment when the broom comes to life and starts to move to the rhythm of the music.
- The moment when the apprentice loses control of the bewitched broom.

Once you have identified the 3 key moments, try to mime them to the music.

(1 group plays the sorcerer's apprentice who tries to bewitch the broom and the other group plays the bewitched broom.)

For inspiration, you can watch the excerpt from Walt Disney's Fantasia, in which Mickey plays

the role of the sorcerer's apprentice.

ONCE UPON A TIME ...

Today we open the white book, like the white colour of the snow that covers everything during winter in Canada.

Once upon a time, in the cold of winter, there was a snowman. He was like all snowmen: a carrot for a nose, two buttons for his two eyes, a scarf, and a tuque!

In the coldest part of winter, he was happy. Children played around him, had snowball fights, built forst, and dug tunnels! But as the weather got warmer, our snowman started to melt. As he shrank visibly, a little girl who lived there had an idea: she put the now-tiny snowman in a snow globe so that he could stay there until the next winter.

Legend has it that the snow globes that decorate houses are populated with characters that bring good luck! That year, the nice little girl received the gift of her dreams ...

- What activities do you like to do in the snow?
- Do you think the little girl's idea to save the snowman was a good one?
- What is your dream gift?

WINTER LEGENDS OF CANADA

"Legends are the poetry of history." - Henry Raymond Casgrain

The legend told in this part was created for the educational purposes of the workshop. However, there are many legends that tell us the story of this great country of Canada.

Most of these legends originated with Canada's First Nations people and then slowly were told by word of mouth and transformed over time with the arrival of immigrants from around the world.

The diversity of these stories makes us lose track of their origin and it is often difficult to find out who told the story first. The telling of these legends allows us to better understand our history!

THE HOLIDAY SEASON IN CANADA

In Canada, the holiday season is like anywhere else in the world: a time for sharing with friends and family. Everyone, according to their beliefs or desires, borrows traditions that can be found all over the world: the tree, the tasty yule log, cookies, Santa Claus, gifts...

But the magic of snow in Canada allows us to live the holiday season in natural settings immaculate in white! Many activities are organized outside: ice skating, the enchantment of the decorated and lit houses and streets, ice structures...

- And you, what are the holiday traditions that you know and love?

DIVE DEEPER BY DISCOVERING

The fabulous Nutcracker ballet

Every year during the holiday season, in many cities across Canada, you can go to see the magical ballet: The Nutcracker by Piotr Illich Tchaïkovski.

DIVE DEEPER BY MOVING

Waltz of the Snowflakes from the ballet The Nutcracker

The Waltz of the Snowflakes, composed by Tchaïkovski for the ballet *The Nutcracker*, is a wonderful representation of snowflakes' ballet in the sky ... If you listen carefully, you will hear a children's choir singing along with the orchestra ...

Listen to the audio and identify the different actions and emotions in the music:

- The moment when the snowflakes dance by the thousands.
- The moment when the storm calms down.
- The magical moment when the children walk in the snow!

Once you have identified the 3 key moments, try to mime them to the music.

(1 group plays the children walking in the snow and the other group plays the dance of the snowflakes turning and swirling.)

ONCE UPON A TIME ...

This time, Gabi chose the golden book ... What legend will it tell us?


Once upon a time, there was a Celtic legend of the winter solstice: for the 12 days between December 25 and January 6, the people of Ireland and Scotland celebrated!

They prepared themselves by going to the market to get butter, eggs, vegetables, meat, spices and dried fruits to make their famous Christmas puddings. They gave each other gifts and organized feasts: banquets around a big bonfire! Singers called "waits" sang the traditional Christmas songs, called "carols." These little choirs would go around singing from house to house in order to bring joy to the inhabitants of the villages.

Legend has it that the villagers would cry tears of joy that would turn into snowflakes and bring the softest snow to the village ...

- Have you ever been lucky enough to have carolers come to your door?
- Do you think carols can bring joy to people's hearts?
- Why or why not?

THE LEGEND OF CELTIC COUNTRIES

In ancient times, the Celtic people lived in France (which was not yet France), in England (which was not yet England), and we still find their traces today, in Ireland, in Scotland, in England, and even in the region of Brittany. In fact, these people were nomads, which means that they travelled a lot. In the Celtic tradition, at the winter solstice, the Oak King, symbol of the Light, won his battle against the Holly King, the king of the Shadow. Both were tree gods, symbols of life.

THE CELTIC HOLIDAY SEASON

The festival of Yule (or Winter Solstice Festival) is part of the Celtic calendar and marks the return of the sun (the days will begin to get longer). Yule symbolizes rebirth and the earth's ability to come back to life. To encourage and celebrate the return of the sun, the Celts decorated their homes with candles to mark the victory of light over the longest night of the year.

- Do you now understand the origin of the name "Julenisse"? The word Julenisse begins with "Jule" derived from "Yule."

FROM THE WOOD LOG TO THE BUTTER LOG

The Celts burned a log on the solstice of December 21. This huge log of wood, which had to burn for 12 days in the fireplace, was a way to welcome the new year while ensuring a good harvest season. And then with time, the tradition slowly changed and the log of wood was transformed into a delicious pastry!

THE CAROLERS

Ensemble ALKEMIA offers us 3 Christmas carols specific to the tradition of the English carolers.

The carolers go around in small groups to spread the Christmas spirit and joy from house to house. They are often dressed in colorful old-fashioned clothing and wear funny top hats! (Click the hyperlink to the right.)

You have to go back a long way to find the first carolers.

This practice is rooted in antiquity during the winter solstice celebrations. Peasants sang at the doors of the houses of the richest in exchange for a little food. These songs were passed on from generation to generation through oral tradition, that is, before writing was even invented!

DIVE DEEPER BY LISTENING

Now that you have listened to the 3 pieces proposed by the Ensemble ALKEMIA, would you be able to answer these few questions:

- In which languages are the Christmas carols sung?
 The songs are all sung in their original language (German, Italian, and English), in French, and in English.
- Do all the singers sing the same thing at the same time? No, each singer sings his own musical line. This is called polyphonic singing.
- Are the songs happy or sad? Most of the time, carolers sing songs of hope!
- Are there any musical instruments to accompany the singers?

 No. The Ensemble ALKEMIA sings without instrumental accompaniment, i.e. "a cappella."

Go around the neighborhood ringing doorbells to sing one or more Christmas songs for your dazzled neighbors!


